1. Call to Order

With a quorum of the City Councilmembers present, Mayor Thompson called the regular meeting of the Garden Ridge City Council to order at 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday, October 2, 2019, in the City Council Chambers of the Garden Ridge City Hall, 9400 Municipal Parkway, Garden Ridge, Texas 78266.

2. Roll Call: See above.

3. Pledge of Allegiance: Mayor Thompson led the Pledge of Allegiance and the Texas Pledge.

4. Proclamations

a) 40th Anniversary of Triumphant Lutheran Church.

Mayor Thompson presented a proclamation to Pastor Aaron Richter, Triumphant Lutheran Church, honoring the 40th Anniversary of Triumphant Lutheran Church.

Pastor Aaron Richter, Triumphant Lutheran Church, thanked Mayor Thompson, City Council, and the City of Garden Ridge for conveying best wishes in the special observance of this occasion and spoke regarding the history of Triumphant Lutheran Church.

b) Domestic Violence Awareness Month.

Mayor Thompson stated in the interest of the City Council requesting to shorten the length of meetings, action items that are straightforward or routine will be placed in the consent agenda and sent to Councilmembers in advance to review and request clarification from City Staff if needed. He stated these items and any supporting documents will still be included in the packet available to the public on the City's website.

Motion: A motion was made by Councilmember Swint, seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem McCaw, to approve the Consent Agenda items 7. a) – d). The City Council voted five (5) for and none (0) opposed. The motion carried unanimously.

8. Staff Reports

The following items are for discussion, consideration, and action.

a) City Administrator Monthly Activity Report.

- **Community Center usage and financial report, Building Permits issued to date for residential, commercial and minor construction projects, City Council Idea/Suggestions, communication efforts, Citizen Concern/Input, and upcoming events.**

Nancy Cain, City Administrator, spoke regarding the implementation of electronic utility billing.

b) Police Department Monthly Activity Report.

- **Traffic Enforcement, criminal activity within City, and Code Compliance Enforcement.**

Chief Eberhardt reviewed the police department monthly activity report and spoke regarding thru truck traffic violating City Ordinance, monitoring for school buses speeding, a second traffic calming device purchased by the Garden Ridge Citizens Police Academy Alumni Association and donated to the Police Department, and National Night Out.

c) Public Works Monthly Activity Report.

- **Street and right-of-way maintenance, drainage facility and easement maintenance, City parking lots and facility maintenance, Animal Services (domestic and wild), Oak Wilt, and Public Works Projects.**

Steven Steinmetz, Public Works Director, reviewed the public works monthly activity report, spoke regarding trapping feral hogs, and addressed questions and comments from Councilmembers.

d) Water Department Monthly Activity Report.

Jacob Parsons, Water Manager, reviewed the water department monthly activity report and addressed questions and comments from Councilmembers.

Linda Crosland, Librarian, reviewed upcoming events at the Garden Ridge Library and spoke regarding the Halloween Trunk or Treat event.

9. City Engineer Projects Status Reports

Pat Lackey, City Engineer, reviewed the Trihydro Corporation – Engineering Report for September 2019 and addressed questions from Councilmembers. The topics of discussion included the following items: FM 2252 TxDOT Project, FM 2252 Wastewater and Water Project, The Woods of Garden Ridge / Bindseil Lane Drainage Project, Draft Transportation Master Plan, Plaza Oaks Water Line, and T. Blackwell Office Building.

10. City Commission and Committee Reports/Recommendations/Possible Actions

a) Planning and Zoning Commission Recommendations and Possible Action:

1. Receive monthly activity update as applicable.

Chair Dr. Miller provided City Council with an update on the topics discussed at the Commission's September meeting. Chair Dr. Miller spoke regarding the Draft Zoning Ordinance, legislative changes, and the strategic steering committee.

b) Quarry Commission Recommendations and Possible Action:

1. Receive monthly activity update as applicable.

Mayor Thompson provided City Council with an update on the Quarry Commission's appointment of Commissioner Johnell Holly as Chair and Commissioner Jerry Barucky as Vice-Chair.

c) Water Commission Recommendations and Possible Action:

1. Water Rate Structure for the City of Garden Ridge.

1.1. Receive recommendation from the Water Commission.

1.2. Take action on recommendation.

Chair Valdez stated the Commission appointed him and Commissioner Harshbarger to form a committee to review and evaluate data for the Commission to present a recommendation to City Council in November concerning water rates.

2. Receive monthly activity update as applicable.

Chair Valdez thanked David Heier and Richard Holloway for their many years of service on the Water Commission and provided City Council with an update on the topics discussed at the Commission's September meeting. He spoke regarding educational opportunities, water conservation, water meters, utility billing enhancements, and Commission vacancies.

d) Wildlife Management Advisory Commission Recommendations and Possible Action:

1. Deer Population Summary and Deer Management Program.

1.1. Receive recommendation from the Wildlife Management Advisory Commission.

Chair Segovia spoke regarding the deer counts conducted with Mr. Hensley, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and stated citizens from the Advocates for Garden Ridge Wildlife nonprofit organization questioned Mr. Hensley's integrity by stating the deer counts were inaccurate even though a volunteer resident participated in each count. Chair Segovia spoke regarding the estimated deer population summary as well as the deer harvest recommendations provided by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Chair Segovia stated the Wildlife Management Advisory Commission unanimously voted to recommend to City Council the deer harvest recommendation of removing 200 deer with preference given to relocating through Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Trap, Transport, and Transplant Permit Program (TTT).

The City Council discussed the estimated deer population summary, citizens feeding deer contributing to an unhealthy herd, the average costs associated with vehicle/deer collisions, and the reduction in number of vehicle/deer collisions.

1.2. Take action on recommendation.

Motion: A motion was made by Councilmember Lantzy, seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem McCaw, to approve the Wildlife Management Advisory Commission's deer harvest recommendation of removing 200 deer with preference given to relocating through Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Trap, Transport, and Transplant Permit Program (TTT). During discussion of the motion, Councilmember Swint stated the decision-making process should include following the advice of experts in addition to considering the wishes of the majority of citizens in Garden Ridge with the recent election numbers being an indicator of the majority wishes. The City Council voted four (4) for and one (1) opposed (Councilmember Bower). The motion passed by a vote of 4-1.

2. Receive monthly activity update as applicable.

Chair Segovia provided City Council with an update on the topics discussed at the Commission's September meeting. She spoke regarding Commissioner McKinney's bat presentation, the butterfly meadow in Paul Davis Park, possible locations for relocating deer, negative comments from residents to Mr. Hensley, and Commissioner McKinney submitting his resignation. Chair Segovia thanked Mr. Hensley for going above and beyond with his assistance to the City even though he has been transitioning into a new position.

Mayor Thompson and Councilmembers thanked Chair Segovia and the Wildlife Management Advisory Commissioners and requested Chair Segovia to pass on their apology to Mr. Hensley for the treatment he received from a few residents. Mayor Thompson spoke regarding Commissioner McKinney's professional knowledge, stating his resignation is a loss to the City and it is unfortunate to hear about a second person now overtly stating their resignation from a Commission is attributed to the environment.

e) Garden Ridge Parks Committee:

1. Receive monthly activity update as applicable.

Dr. Miller, Parks Committee, spoke regarding volunteers, equipment at pocket parks, event planning, and working with the Public Works Department as well as the Wildlife Management Advisory Commission.

f) Volunteer Garden Ridge!

1. Receive monthly activity update as applicable.

Nancy Cain, City Administrator, stated *Volunteer Garden Ridge!* reported 284 hours for September.

Dr. Jim Miller, *Volunteer Garden Ridge!*, spoke regarding using the web-based application called SignUpGenius as a new outreach effort to recruit additional volunteers.

11. Approvals/Authorizations

The following items are for discussion, consideration, and action.

a) Adoption of the City of Garden Ridge Capital Improvements Advisory Committee Procedural Rules.

Nancy Cain, City Administrator, spoke regarding the duties and responsibilities of the Capital Improvements Advisory Committee, adding this was previously referred to as an Impact Fee Committee. She recommended City Council adopt the procedural rules in order for the process of seeking qualified applicants to begin.

Motion: A motion was made by Councilmember Bower, seconded by Councilmember Arvidson, to adopt the City of Garden Ridge Capital Improvements Advisory Committee Procedural Rules. The City Council voted five (5) for and none (0) opposed. The motion carried unanimously.

b) Discuss and take action on Ordinance No. 222-102019 An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Garden Ridge, Texas, prohibiting the placement of memorial markers on City property, and prohibiting urban gardening and unauthorized landscaping or cultivation on City-owned property and rights-of-way; providing a penalty for violations of this Ordinance; providing a cumulative and savings clause; providing a severability clause; and declaring an effective date.

Nancy Cain, City Administrator, stated with the improvements and money put into various investments on City property, it is important to protect and maintain these properties. She reviewed Ordinance No. 222-102019 and addressed questions and comments from Councilmembers.

Councilmember Bower and Councilmember Lantzy spoke regarding edits and revisions and requested the following: revise the section allowing City Administrator approval to require City Council approval, consistency among the use of the term rights-of way throughout the Ordinance, and addition of neutral language that consists of his or her.

Motion: A motion was made by Councilmember Bower, seconded by Councilmember Lantzy, to make the discussed revisions and approve Ordinance No. 222-102019 An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Garden Ridge, Texas, prohibiting the placement of memorial markers on City property, and prohibiting urban gardening and unauthorized landscaping or cultivation on City-owned property and rights-of-way; providing a penalty for violations of this Ordinance; providing a cumulative and savings clause; providing a severability clause; and declaring an effective date. The City Council voted five (5) for and none (0) opposed. The motion carried unanimously.

c) Implementation of Ordinance No. 34-072019.

1. Review and discuss Third-Party Monitoring Contract.

Cynthia Trevino, City Attorney, reviewed the third-party monitoring contract provisions in Ordinance No. 34-072019 and discussed the third-party monitoring contract provided by VibraTech, Inc. She stated upon legal review, the contract meets the requirements in Ordinance No. 34-072019 as well as all requirements for a governmental contract.

2. Authorize City Administrator to execute contract.

Motion: A motion was made by Councilmember Lantzy, seconded by Councilmember Swint, to authorize the City Administrator to execute the Third-Party Monitoring Contract. The City Council voted five (5) for and none (0) opposed. The motion carried unanimously.

3. Receive additional updates related to the implementation of Ordinance No. 34-072019.

Cynthia Trevino, City Attorney, provided City Council with additional updates related to the implementation of the revised process when submitting the citizen blast impact report form.

12. Updates

a) City Administrator Reports.

1. Update on CIP projects.

Nancy Cain, City Administrator, provided City Council with an update on remaining CIP projects and funds.

2. Update on City use of password management system.

Marisa Spencer, City Secretary, provided City Council with an update on the implementation and training sessions for City use of the password management system.

b) Mayor's Projects.

1. Communication Report/Signage.

Mayor Thompson spoke regarding removing the electronic sign and making improvements at the entrance of Municipal Parkway since repairing the current electronic sign is not worth the cost for its limited utility.

Mayor Thompson stated he was made aware of a potential issue related to City Council communications and response/handling of citizen contacts after the agenda was posted; however, the item requires immediate attention. Pursuant to Texas Government Code Section 551.071 Consultation with Attorney, Mayor Thompson stated he is calling an executive session based on the executive session agenda notices which authorizes an executive session on any matter posted on the agenda, but this will be deferred to agenda item 16. Executive Session.

2. Citizen Contact Report.

Mayor Thompson stated after a citizen contacted him concerned about school buses on Schoenthal, the Police Department increased their presence during peak times, monitored the area, and did not observe any school buses speeding. Mayor Thompson thanked the citizen for bringing this concern to his attention and thanked Chief Eberhardt for increasing the police presence and continuing to monitor the area in response to the citizen contact. Mayor Thompson also spoke regarding the process for Councilmembers to follow when receiving and responding to citizen emails if they include all Councilmembers.

3. City Facility Update.

3.1. Audio/Visual Upgrades and Streaming.

Marisa Spencer, City Secretary, provided City Council with an update on integrating the online portal that enables indexing streamed videos to the City's website and stated all Commission meetings will now be streamed to the City's YouTube channel to follow the same process as City Council while the Commission agenda templates are being created and finalized.

4. Ordinance Revision Process.

Mayor Thompson stated the Zoning and Subdivision Ordinance is currently in the revision process by the Planning and Zoning Commission, the Water Commission is currently reviewing the Water Ordinances, and the Parks Committee provided recommendations for revisions to Ordinance No. 24 to include the new pavilion.

5. TxDOT Coordination.

Mayor Thompson stated he does not have new updates at this time, but this item is still pending.

6. GRES Traffic Flow and FM 3009 Safety.

Mayor Thompson spoke regarding the effectiveness of Garden Ridge Elementary School implementing two lanes of traffic for pick up and drop off even though when this idea was suggested by himself and Chief Eberhardt months ago they were told the idea would not work. Furthermore, Mayor Thompson stated that even since the addition of two lanes, the school has yet to say anything about it to the City. Mayor Thompson stated that all traffic on FM 3009 is no longer school related due to this change. Mayor Thompson and Councilmembers discussed recently being informed that Garden Ridge Elementary School has a traffic plan and how City Council nor City Staff have seen this plan.

c) City Council Projects.

1. Dedication of the Gardens of Garden Ridge (Swint).

Councilmember Swint spoke regarding the event dedicating the Gardens of Garden Ridge and thanked Jan Martin and Rick Cross for their hard work as well as everyone that supported and attended the event.

2. Garden Ridge Market Days (Swint).

Councilmember Swint announced Saturday, October 14th as the next date for Garden Ridge Market Days, adding this Market will be Halloween themed. She stated the Comal Master Gardeners have been confirmed as the non-profit organization for October.

3. New Resident Package (Swint and Bower).

Councilmember Swint and Councilmember Bower stated this is a continued work in progress.

4. Traffic Flow in the City of Garden Ridge (Lantzy).

Councilmember Lantzy spoke regarding the current and proposed asphalt plant routes to assist with traffic flow in the City of Garden Ridge. The City Council and Chief Eberhardt discussed possible authorization by granting an exception to the City Ordinance, the company maintaining the roadway, and executing a written agreement between the company and the City.

5. Length of City Council Meetings (Lantzy).

Councilmember Lantzy spoke regarding the length of recent City Council meetings and options of how to shorten future meetings, requesting this item to remain on the agenda for another month to receive any additional thoughts or options from Councilmembers or City Staff.

6. Update on Vulcan Construction Materials, LLC Project (Arvidson).

Councilmember Arvidson stated it is unlikely there will be new information regarding this item; therefore, this item can be removed from the agenda.

7. Pets (Bower).

Councilmember Bower spoke regarding being a responsible pet owner and obeying laws and City Ordinances as they pertain to all pets.

13. Discussion of Future Agenda Items: None.

14. Citizen Comment Period – limited to 20 minutes total

Mayor Thompson reviewed the rules for Citizen Comment Period.

Jerry Barucky, 20806 Woodland Cove, spoke regarding negativity changing the community and stated Councilmembers and Commissioners are hardworking volunteers that do not deserve to be attacked.

Rick Cross, 20637 Wahl Lane, spoke regarding expressing different opinions civilly and respectfully and expressed his appreciation to City Council for their hard work and effort in serving the City.

Ken Kneupper, 8891 Schoenthal Road, spoke regarding negativity towards volunteers.

Cynthia Shanahan-Segovia, 8435 Twisted Oaks, thanked Rick Cross for the hard work and dedication he put into the Gardens of Garden Ridge.

Dr. Jim Miller, 9910 Marie Meadow, spoke regarding City Council's discussion about the asphalt plant bypass.

David Dauer, 20003 Regency Run, spoke regarding conducting deer counts and the asphalt plant routes.

Mayor Thompson adjourned the Executive Session and reconvened back into Regular Session at 10:20 p.m.

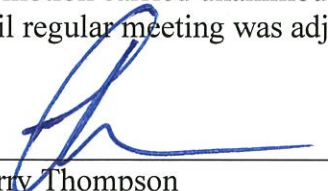
17. Business Items

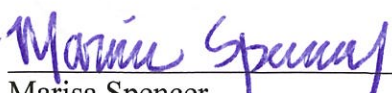
18. Adjournment
