This is an open meeting, open to the public, subject to the Open Meetings Law of the State of Texas, and as required by law, notice is hereby posted on March 16, 2018 before 5:00 p.m., providing time, place, date and agenda thereof. 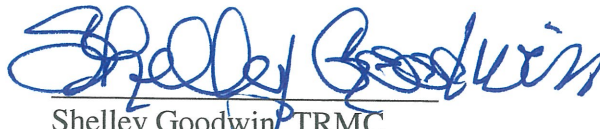

1. Call to Order

With a quorum of the Wildlife Management Advisory Commission Members present, the Regular Meeting of the Garden Ridge Wildlife Management Advisory Commission was called to order by Chairman Krawczynski at 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, February 20, 2018 in the City Council Chambers of the Garden Ridge City Hall, 9400 Municipal Parkway, Garden Ridge, Texas 78266.

2. Pledge Allegiance

Chairman Krawczynski led the pledge of allegiance.

3. Citizen's Participation

Martha Stipp, 21007 Cedar Branch, recommended the Commission do an autopsy on a deer they suspect has bottle neck, because she feels it could actually be lumpy jaw or other diseases. She also stated some diseases are curable and provided a handout (see attached handout). She recommended the Commission take guidance from Texas Parks and Wildlife.

4. Business Items-

The Committee may discuss, consider and/or take possible action on the following items:

a) Minutes-

- i. January 18, 2017 Wildlife Management Advisory Commission Regular Meeting.**

Motion: A motion was made by Commissioner Sullivan, and seconded by Commissioner Kneupper, to approve the Wildlife Management Advisory Commission Regular Meeting Minutes from January 18, 2017. The Wildlife Management Advisory Commission voted five (5) for, none (0) opposed. The motion carried unanimously.

ii. Set date, time, and location for next Regular Meeting (Monday, March 19, 2018)

Motion: A motion was made by Commissioner Sullivan, and seconded by Commissioner Hannasch, to hold the next Wildlife Management Advisory Commission Regular Meeting on Monday, March 19, 2018 at 6:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers. The Wildlife Management Advisory Commission voted five (5) for, none (0) opposed. The motion carried unanimously.

b) Recommendations

i. Wildlife Management Advisory Commission vacancy (term expiring September 2018)

a. Interview possible candidate/candidates.

Dean Lemmers stated he has been a resident of the City of Garden Ridge for over 20 years. He stated he is retired and enjoys all the wildlife in Garden Ridge. He stated he also has a place in New Mexico and is a conservationist. He stated he has read all the Wildlife Management Advisory Commission Agendas, Minutes and Ordinance in order to make sound judgments on issues that will come up.

The Commission reviewed his resume and asked him questions regarding his availability, wildlife challenges, what he can offer to the Commission and whether he attended or watched the Wildlife Education Session.

Dawn Hatch stated she has been a resident of the City of Garden Ridge for over 20 years. She stated she is currently employed as a Legal Assistant and is a Certified Texas Naturalist. She stated she believes it is important to learn to co-exist with the wildlife.

The Commission reviewed her resume and asked her questions regarding her availability, wildlife challenges, what she can offer to the Commission and whether she attended or watched the Wildlife Education Session.

b. Consideration on a recommendation to the City Council for an appointment of Commissioner.

Motion: A motion was made by Commissioner Hannasch, and seconded by Vice Chairman Segovia, to recommend to the City Council the appointment of Dawn Hatch to fill the Wildlife Management Advisory Commission vacancy with the term expiring September 2018. The Wildlife Management Advisory Commission voted five (5) for, none (0) opposed. The motion carried unanimously.

ii. Wildlife Management Survey

a. The process, expenses, and volunteer hours update.

Nancy Cain, City Administrator, reviewed the expenses and the volunteer hours. She also reviewed the process used in creating the surveys, mailing the surveys, returned surveys,

organizing the surveys and the process used to tabulate the surveys. She stated everything was done on camera and the box containing the surveys was locked with 2 keys, with the Police Chief keeping one and the City Secretary the other one. She stated the box also had a recorded hasp on it and the hasp was only broken to organize and tabulate, and was replaced with another recorded hasp after organizing and tabulating was conducted.

Vice Chairman Segovia stated she came to City Hall several times to watch the tabulations of the surveys. She stated the process was conducted with the utmost integrity and she thanked the volunteers; especially Marilyn Winters and Peggy Campbell.

b. Receive tabulation totals of the survey.

Nancy Cain, City Administrator, stated 1,159 total surveys were submitted and 1,140 were tabulated. She then reviewed the Wildlife Survey Totals spreadsheet. She stated the Comments were not listed since over 80% of the returned surveys contained comments. She stated some of the comments were one sentence and others were two and three pages. She recommended the Commission hold a Special Meeting to review the comments.

c. Review and discussion of survey results.

The Commission reviewed the survey results for each question asked.

d. Make a recommendation on Wildlife Management to the City Council.

The Commission agreed by consensus to review the comments before they make a recommendation to the City Council regarding the Wildlife Management.

e. Set a possible Special Meeting or Workshop to review comments provided by residents, a possible further review of tabulation results of the Wildlife Management Survey with possible development of a recommendation to City Council.

Nancy Cain, City Administrator, stated the tabulations were conducted by subdivisions and the returned surveys are still in those bundles.

The Commission discussed several ways to review the comments that residents included on the survey. They discussed whether to have a subcommittee reading, to have the volunteers who conducted the tabulations read the comments, or hold a Special Meeting.

Motion: A motion was made by Commissioner Sullivan, and seconded by Commissioner Hannasch, to hold a Special Meeting on February 27, 2018 at 6 p.m. in the City Council Chambers to review survey comments and possibly make a recommendation to the City Council for Wildlife Management. The Wildlife Management Advisory Commission voted five (5) for, none (0) opposed. The motion carried unanimously.

c) Discussions/Reports

i. Review and discuss wildlife and wildlife incidents within the City of Garden Ridge.

a. Police

b. Animal Control

The Wildlife Management Advisory Commission reviewed the Police Department Report and the Animal Control Report. The Commission pointed out the Animal Control Report counts were higher and felt the increase should be looked into.

ii. Presentation of the Wildlife Management Advisory Commission binder of ordinances that apply under the Commission's purview, Commissioners' contact information, Commissioners' places and terms, and additional information to assist in making Commission recommendations and outlining Commission duties.

a. Mayor Thompson review of Ordinance 210-022018.

Chairman Krawczynski presented the Commission with their Commission binders. He stated Mayor Thompson was unable to attend the Commission Meeting, but he will review Commission Ordinance 210-022018 at the March Regular Meeting.

iii. Availability and Distribution of Live Traps (Sullivan).

Commissioner Sullivan reported the City of Garden Ridge has 8 live traps in 5 different sizes. He stated residents can contact City Hall and pay \$40 to borrow a trap and after the trap is returned, the \$40 deposit is refunded. He also stated if something was caught in the trap, Animal Control will come out to remove what was caught.

iv. Update on Bottle Neck disease recently detected in local deer herd (Segovia).

Vice-Chairman Segovia presented the pictures of the deer within Garden Ridge who Texas Parks and Wildlife believe have bottle neck disease. She reviewed the process of the disease and process for detecting the disease. She also stated she has spoken to Texas Parks and Wildlife several times regarding the disease and the local herd of deer. She stated this disease takes two years to develop.

Motion: A motion was made by Commissioner Sullivan, and seconded by Commissioner Hannasch, to recommend to City Council that an autopsy be conducted on any deer that has been killed or injured in order to find out exactly what disease the local deer have. The Wildlife Management Advisory Commission voted five (5) for, none (0) opposed. The motion carried unanimously.

v. City Council February 7, 2018, Regular Meeting Update/Report.

Councilmember Erickson, reported City Council discussed the Wildlife Survey tabulation process and the bottle neck disease.

Vice Chairman Segovia stated Councilmember McCaw also provided the City Council with research he had done on the City of Hollywood Park's Wildlife Management program.

vi. Update on future education/training sessions and Grapevine articles.

Commissioner Kneupper stated he would write the Grapevine article for the March education/training sessions.

vii. Discussion on Future Agenda Items.

The Commission added the following:

- Cost and a provider to do an autopsy on a deer (Krawczynski).
- Update on survey and next steps (Sullivan).

5. Citizen Participation

Martha Stipp, 21007 Cedar Branch, stated if the Commission and City Council choose to trap deer, she requested that the nets and trapping process not occur in public places.

Lee Tucker, 9614 Teakwood, spoke on different techniques that can be used to review the comments on the surveys.

Dr. Jim Miller, 9910 Marie Meadow, encouraged the Commission to put the survey results online. He asked if the intent for asking what subdivision you live in was to get the opinion of where the large deer population is and how the residents in those areas feel.

5. Adjournment

Motion: Upon a motion made by Commissioner Knuepper and a second by Commissioner Hannasch, the meeting was adjourned at 7:43 p.m.

Lumpy Jaw in White-tailed Deer

With the white-tailed deer hunting season now upon us, most hunters are already in the woods looking for that big, mature buck. However, as is often the case when in the field, hunters will see the strangest things — and sometimes those odd things include deer with different diseases and other issues. One fairly common problem in whitetail is **lumpy jaw**. The name “lumpy jaw” says it all because deer with this problem stick out; The animal looks like it has a lump between (or under) its jawbone and the hide.

The lumpy jaw many hunters witness is the result of adult arterial nematodes (*Elaeophora schneideri*). These worms live primarily in the whitetail's carotid arteries. In fact, partial paralysis of the deer's jaw muscles occurs when high arterial worm infestations reduce blood flow. As a result of jaw muscle paralysis, food becomes trapped inside the deer's mouth and this food impaction leads to the lumpy jaw and/or swollen cheek appearance. The impaction often causes tooth loss, bone decay, and sometimes even death.



So now your thinking, how do white-tailed deer get lumpy jaw? Well, the common horsefly passes the nematode larvae from an infected deer to an uninfected one by feeding on deer blood. The horsefly carrying larvae-infected blood is ultimately what perpetuates this lumpy jaw condition in deer.

Luckily for property owners, hunters, and the deer, infection rates in are not high enough to impact white-tailed deer populations. Arterial worms, like most other deer issues, do not pose a risk to humans, but as a hunter I don't like to think about the deer I harvest as having arterial worms, nasal bots, or any other of the many diseases, viruses, or things deer can possibly tote around.



And on that note, arterial worms are not the only creatures that can give white-tailed deer that lumpy jaw appearance. A bacterium called *Actinomyces bovis* can also cause an infection of the jawbone. This bacterium is actually a common inhabitant of the mouths of healthy whitetail. It is when a sharp object such as a thorn punctures the inner lining of the mouth that *A. bovis* bacteria are allowed to invade the tissues.

Additionally, healthy deer — like all animals — can simply get large or odd-shaped food items caught in their mouth. However, food impaction in white-tailed deer is often the result of arterial worms that cause muscle issues that lead to food impaction and lumpy jaw syndrome. As mentioned previously, deer with lumpy jaw do not pose a health problem for hunters and the meat can be safely consumed.

The Commission discussed the process for Trap, Transport and Transplant and the realistic possibility of finding a ranch to transplant to. They also discussed the darting process and hog issues in Trophy Oaks. They also discussed the process of Trap, Transport and Process.

b) Possible recommendation to City Council regarding Wildlife Management Survey tabulations and future Wildlife Management Plan.

Motion: A motion was made by Commissioner Bippert, and second by Commissioner Hannasch, to recommend to the City Council that the Wildlife Management Advisory Commission research ways to reduce the overpopulation of deer. The Wildlife Management Advisory Commission voted five (5) for, none (0) opposed. The motion carried unanimously.

Motion: A motion was made by Vice Chairman Segovia, and second by Commissioner Hannasch, to recommend to the City Council that the no feeding Ordinance 186 be enforced. The Wildlife Management Advisory Commission voted five (5) for, none (0) opposed. The motion carried unanimously.

Motion: A motion was made by Commissioner Bippert, and second by Commissioner Kneupper, to recommend to the City Council that the Wildlife Management Advisory Commission continue to research ways to handle other wildlife issues including wild hogs. The Wildlife Management Advisory Commission voted five (5) for, none (0) opposed. The motion carried unanimously.

c) Possible direction to Staff for the next step regarding Wildlife Management Survey.

The Commission agreed by consensus that they need to provide their recommendations to the City Council and then decide on next steps.

4. Citizen Participation

Dr. Jim Miller, 9910 Marie Meadow, encouraged the Commission to work with a university to help collect data, focus on the subdivisions with the higher deer counts and the survey results for those areas, and ensure that the no feeding ordinance include all types of feeding (corn and scraps). He also encouraged the Commission to review their budget to include more management and live traps.
