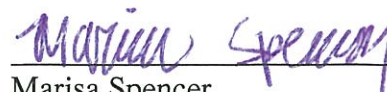

Developing a Butterfly Garden

1. Prepare the soil
2. Select plants for **nectar**
 - a. Plant in masses
 - b. Plan to provide blooming plants throughout the season
3. Select plants for larval stage or **host plants** for the developing caterpillars)
 - a. Arrange host plants around the garden to prevent predators from killing caterpillars located all in one area
4. Plant in **sunny** locations – More sun more nectar.
5. **Mulch** to prevent weeds and to keep the soil moist.
6. **Water** from below (prevents diluting or washing off the nectar)
7. Provide **basking** areas (rocks or logs in sunny locations).
Butterflies need to warm up on cool days before they can fly.
8. **Puddling:** Provide moist soil or moist sand. Butterflies get salts and amino acids from naturally forming low lying moist areas usually contaminated by polluted dung, urine or dead animals.
9. **DO NOT** use pesticides on plants
10. Opt: Provide **bait stations** with rotten fruit, fermented or sweet liquids
11. **Adopt** a weed that butterflies utilize at the back of the garden
12. **Hibernation** – cracks in logs, fence posts, loose boards, or tree bark are all potential hibernating sites.

Butterfly Mash

To attract and feed butterflies in your yard.

6-8 overripe bananas
1 cup brown sugar
2 cans of beer

Mash the bananas in a blender with the sugar and beer. Then pour the mixture into a container with plenty of room to expand and let that ferment a couple of days. Leave the lid on loose allowing it to "breathe" or it will EXPLODE. Might want to leave it outside on the porch but not in direct sunlight. Refrigerate for slow fermentation.

That mash can be poured onto a feeding tray of some sort or on a tree trunk or elsewhere.

Pour on a feeder log that has a scooped out section, hang from a wire with a film cassette fixed to block exploring ants.

Make a Puddling Area

- Make a indentation in the ground and remove the soil.
- Line it with plastic
- Position it close to a water source
- Add moist sand
- Layer with table salt or rock salt (ratio of $\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{3}{4}$ cup to one gallon of soil)
- Add more moist sand
- A bit of manure over the top will make it more attractive.

1. Call to Order

With a quorum of the Wildlife Management Advisory Commission members present, the regular meeting of the Garden Ridge Wildlife Management Advisory Commission was called to order by Chair Segovia at 6:02 p.m. on Monday, March 18, 2019, in the City Council Chambers of the Garden Ridge City Hall, 9400 Municipal Parkway, Garden Ridge, Texas 78266.

2. Roll Call

3. Pledge of Allegiance

Chair Segovia led the Pledge of Allegiance.

4. Wildlife Management Advisory Commission Chair Statement

Chair Segovia stated the Commission is comprised of volunteers that chose to volunteer because of their love for wildlife. Chair Segovia spoke regarding the work, actions, and pro-active approaches taken to manage the deer population, adding the Commission is currently working on becoming a Monarch City and finalizing a comprehensive Wildlife Management Plan for the City.

5. Citizen Comment Period – limited to 30 minutes total

No one signed up to speak.

6. Business Items

The Commission may discuss, consider, and/or take possible action, including recommendations, on the following items:

a) Education/Training Session – Judit Green, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department: “Wildscaping” (limited to 30 minutes total)(Segovia)

Chair Segovia introduced Judit Green, Urban Wildlife Biologist for Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and stated she would be providing an educational program followed by a Commission question and answer session.

Judit Green, Urban Wildlife Biologist for Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, reviewed the presentation “Creating Habitat Along the Monarch Highway” (see attached). After the presentation, she answered and addressed questions, comments, and concerns from Commissioners.

The Commission thanked Judit Green for taking the time to attend the meeting and provide an educational program.

b) Approvals

i. Minutes for February 25, 2019, Wildlife Management Advisory Commission Regular Meeting.

Motion: A motion was made by Commissioner Sullivan, seconded by Commissioner Kneupper, to approve the minutes for February 25, 2019, Wildlife Management Advisory Commission Regular Meeting. The Commission voted six (6) for and none (0) opposed. The motion carried unanimously.

c) Discussions/Reports

i. Wildlife and wildlife incidents within the City of Garden Ridge.

1. Police Department

The Commission reviewed the wildlife report from the Police Department.

2. Animal Services

The Commission reviewed the wildlife report from Animal Services as well as the comparison numbers from previous years.

d) Updates/Recommendations

i. Development of comprehensive Wildlife Management Plan for Garden Ridge.

1. Discuss and make possible recommendations regarding topics and/or items in the Wildlife Management Plan for Garden Ridge.

Commissioner McKinney reviewed and discussed the March 2019 additions and updates to the City of Garden Ridge Wildlife Management Plan draft. Chair Segovia spoke regarding filling in the section “Mayor’s Monarch Pledge” under Primary Goals and Vice-Chair Krawczynski spoke regarding filling in the section “Dark Sky Community” under Primary Goals. The Commission discussed obtaining approximate aerial acreage of each primary habitat type within the City of Garden Ridge. The Commission discussed the Wildlife Management Plan draft, provided feedback, and input. The Commission also discussed submitting this document to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department once it is complete.

Commissioner McKinney spoke regarding brown-headed cowbirds, declining songbird populations, online cowbird certification training, and trapping brown-headed cowbirds to control songbird nest parasitism. The Commission discussed obtaining data, documents, and further information to explore this topic more in depth.

Chair Segovia thanked Commissioner McKinney for creating and continuing to update and expand this draft to assist the Commission in developing a comprehensive plan, adding this will be an ongoing agenda item.

ii. Update on Deer Management.

Nancy Cain, City Administrator, provide the Commission with an update on deer management, adding she will provide finalized information at the April Commission meeting. She answered and addressed questions, comments, and concerns from Commissioners. The Commission discussed the possibility of being able to go with Mr. Murphy and observe the process.

iii. Commissioner's Projects

1. Health of wildlife in Garden Ridge.

The Commission had nothing to discuss at this time.
