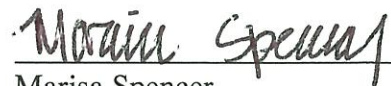

1. Call to Order

With a quorum of the Wildlife Management Advisory Commission members present, the regular meeting of the Garden Ridge Wildlife Management Advisory Commission was called to order by Chair Segovia at 6:00 p.m. on Monday, April 15, 2019, in the City Council Chambers of the Garden Ridge City Hall, 9400 Municipal Parkway, Garden Ridge, Texas 78266.

2. Roll Call

3. Pledge of Allegiance

Chair Segovia led the Pledge of Allegiance.

4. Wildlife Management Advisory Commission Chair Statement

Chair Segovia provided a brief background on past and present actions taken regarding deer management in the City of Garden Ridge. Chair Segovia also spoke regarding the work, actions, and pro-active approaches taken to support and enhance wildlife in the City of Garden Ridge.

5. Citizen Comment Period – limited to 30 minutes total

Kay Bower, 8947 Garden Ridge Drive, spoke regarding toxic plants and weeds, the Parks Committee working with the Wildlife Management Advisory Commission, and plans for Paul Davis Park.

6. Business Items

The Commission may discuss, consider, and/or take possible action, including recommendations, on the following items:

a) Education/Training Session – Linda Valdez, Comal County Master Gardener and Master Naturalist: Gardening for Butterflies (limited to 30 minutes total)(Segovia)

Chair Segovia introduced Linda Valdez, Comal County Master Gardener and Master Naturalist, and stated she would be providing an educational program followed by a Commission question and answer session.

Linda Valdez, Comal County Master Gardener and Master Naturalist, reviewed the presentation “Gardening for Butterflies”. She answered and addressed questions, comments, and concerns from Commissioners. The Commission thanked Linda Valdez for taking the time to attend the meeting and provide an educational program.

b) Approvals

i. Minutes for March 18, 2019, Wildlife Management Advisory Commission Regular Meeting.

Motion: A motion was made by Commissioner Sullivan, seconded by Commissioner Kneupper, to approve the minutes for March 18, 2019, Wildlife Management Advisory Commission Regular Meeting. The Commission voted five (5) for and none (0) opposed. The motion carried unanimously.

c) Discussions/Reports

i. Wildlife and wildlife incidents within the City of Garden Ridge.

1. Police Department

The Commission reviewed the wildlife report from the Police Department.

2. Animal Services

The Commission reviewed the wildlife report from Animal Services.

d) Updates/Recommendations

i. Development of comprehensive Wildlife Management Plan for Garden Ridge.

1. Discuss and make possible recommendations regarding topics and/or items in the Wildlife Management Plan for Garden Ridge.

Chair Segovia stated Commissioners just received an updated plan and asked them to review this detailed plan throughout the next month and email any feedback, changes, questions, etc. to Marisa Spencer, City Secretary, to be forwarded to Commissioner McKinney.

Commissioner Hatch stated she was not feeling well and left the meeting at 6:45 p.m.

ii. Update on Deer Management.

Nancy Cain, City Administrator, reviewed the “City of Garden Ridge Whitetail Management Report 2019” presentation that was provided to City Council by Ryan Murphy, RMH Ranch Services, LLC., at the April 3, 2019, City Council Regular Meeting. She also discussed the current contract with RMH Ranch Services, LLC.

Commissioner Sullivan spoke regarding the trapping process conducted by Ryan Murphy. He stated he had the opportunity to see the process with Mr. Murphy and felt it was the most humane way possible when it comes to ending the life of deer, adding there are many inaccurate rumors about this process.

Chair Segovia stated she confirmed with Mr. Hensley, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, that CWD testing must be conducted every year. She spoke regarding Eric Lowman, Animal Services, conducting CWD testing with Mr. Hensley’s assistance to speed up the testing process. The Commission agreed by consensus to allow Wildlife Management Advisory Commissioners to assist Eric Lowman, Animal Services, with CWD testing.

Motion: A motion was made by Vice-Chair Krawczynski, seconded by Commissioner Sullivan, to recommend to City Council the Commission begin their efforts of obtaining permits for the 2019-2020 season. During the discussion of the motion, the Commission discussed needing a proposed number of deer as well as a proposed budget in order to submit these permits. The Commission requested these items be added to the May agenda.

Motion Rescinded: Vice-Chair Krawczynski rescinded his motion and Commissioner Sullivan rescinded his second.

iii. Commissioner’s Projects

1. Health of wildlife in Garden Ridge.

The Commission had nothing to discuss at this time.

Chair Segovia stated Mr. Hensley and his supervisor will be at the Commission's July meeting to review procedures for conducting deer counts.

Dear Jeanine,

Today, we announced the first detection of *Pseudogymnoascus destructans* (Pd), the fungus that causes White-nose Syndrome (WNS), on two Mexican free-tailed bats at Bracken Cave. Texas Parks and Wildlife announced today the fungus has spread into 11 new counties in Texas, including into Central, South, and East Texas.

We have been a leader in the fight to save bats from White-nose Syndrome (WNS) over the past decade. Here in Texas, we have been taking proactive measures to combat this fungus and protect our bats for years.

We will not back down from this threat. We are working closely with Texas Parks and Wildlife as well as the WNS research community to continue expanding our efforts to understand what this means for bats in Texas, and to develop long-term solutions for protecting bat species vulnerable to this terrible disease.

It is important to note that while the fungus that causes the WNS disease has been detected, **there is no evidence of WNS at Bracken Cave or in its resident bats.**

Mexican free-tailed bats at Bracken Cave will likely not be vulnerable to WNS.

WNS typically kills bats that hibernate for long periods during winter. Luckily, Mexican free-tailed bats stay active hunting insects and migrate south during winter months.

As BCI supporters, we know you will likely have additional questions. We've addressed some of these in the Q&A below.

Q; What does this mean for the future of Bracken Cave and its bats?

A: Our conservation scientists are monitoring our bats very closely. Bracken Cave is a maternity roost of Mexican free-tailed bats, a species that is not likely to be vulnerable to WNS. The disease WNS kills bats that hibernate for long periods during winter. Mexican free-tailed bats migrate south and stay active during winter. We will be increasing our surveillance and monitoring at Bracken Cave and surrounding caves in the Texas Hill Country to inform bat conservation response efforts.

Q: Will BCI close Bracken Cave to visitors to prevent the spread of the fungus? Why not?

A: We do not plan to close Bracken Cave to visitors. Visitors watching the bat flight will not come into contact with the fungus or risk spreading it.

Q: If I visit Bracken Cave, do I risk spreading the fungus to bats in my hometown?

A: No. Watching the bat flight at Bracken should not risk spreading the fungus because you won't come into contact with the fungus.

Q: What is BCI doing to protect bats from WNS?

A: BCI has been a leader in the fight against WNS. We have been working tirelessly to identify ways to protect bat populations and prevent further spread of the invasive fungus in North America. We partner with a diverse team of collaborators -- from academic researchers to resource managers -- to implement field research and identify critical needs to protect the bats most impacted by this disease. In the past year, our staff have implemented surveillance and treatment research projects in over 7 US states and Canadian Provinces and worked on multiple approaches to finding long-term and innovative solutions to protecting bats from this deadly disease.

Fungus Causing White-Nose Syndrome in Bats Continues to Spread in Texas

AUSTIN — The fungus that causes white-nose syndrome (WNS) in bats has continued to spread into parts of Central, South, and East Texas, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The fungus was detected for the first time in Texas in early 2017 in six Panhandle counties. This year it was detected at 22 sites in 16 counties, 11 of which were new. There are now 21 counties in Texas where the fungus has been detected in Texas. It was found on 43 cave myotis, 4 tri-colored bats, and 13 Mexican free-tailed bats. No signs of WNS, the disease in bats caused by the fungus, were reported. Biologists say it usually takes a few years after detecting the fungus for the disease to manifest.

A detection in Liberty County is the first yet in East Texas. Detections in Frio and Victoria Counties are now the most southerly detections of the fungus in the country.

“The amount the fungus has spread this year is concerning” said Jonah Evans, TPWD mammologist. “On the bright side, we have yet to observe any signs of white-nose syndrome and there is some hope that the disease won’t be as severe in Texas as it has been in states further north. Also, because Mexican free-tailed bats primarily migrate during the winter and fungus is deadly to bats that hibernate, we are hopeful that it won’t severely impact this species.”

The syndrome has killed millions of hibernating bats in the eastern parts of the United States, raising national concern. It only poses a risk to bats and does not pose any threat to humans.

White-nose syndrome is caused by the cold-adapted fungus *Pseudogymnoascus destructans* and has been rapidly spreading since its discovery in New York in 2007. It is thought to have been introduced from Europe where bats appear to be resistant to the fungus. In some parts of the eastern United States there have been declines in winter bat numbers of greater than 90 percent. Because bats usually produce just one offspring per year, researchers are concerned it could take many decades for some populations to recover from a major decline.

Skin swabs that test for presence of the fungus on bats’ wings and muzzle were collected between December 2018 and April 2019 by biologists from Bat Conservation International (BCI), the Texas A&M Natural Resources Institute, and Texas Parks and Wildlife. Analyses were conducted by Northern Arizona University and the USGS National Wildlife Health Center as part of on-going research projects.

Treatments for WNS are in early phases of development. Texas Parks and Wildlife, Texas A&M, and Kennesaw University are collaborating on an effort to test treatments to prevent WNS on tri-colored bats roosting in culverts in East Texas this winter. The project is funded by the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation. Bat Conservation International has also tested treatments where the fungus first appeared in the Texas panhandle.

Bats play an important role in the ecosystem by consuming large numbers of insects. Recent studies have shown that the value of insect control by bats to agriculture is \$1.4 billion annually in Texas alone. This value includes reduced crop loss to insect pests, reduced spread of crop diseases, and reduced need for pesticide application.

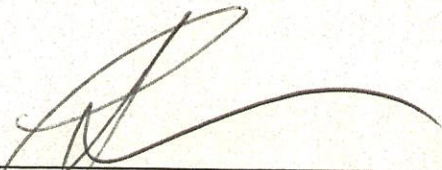
